



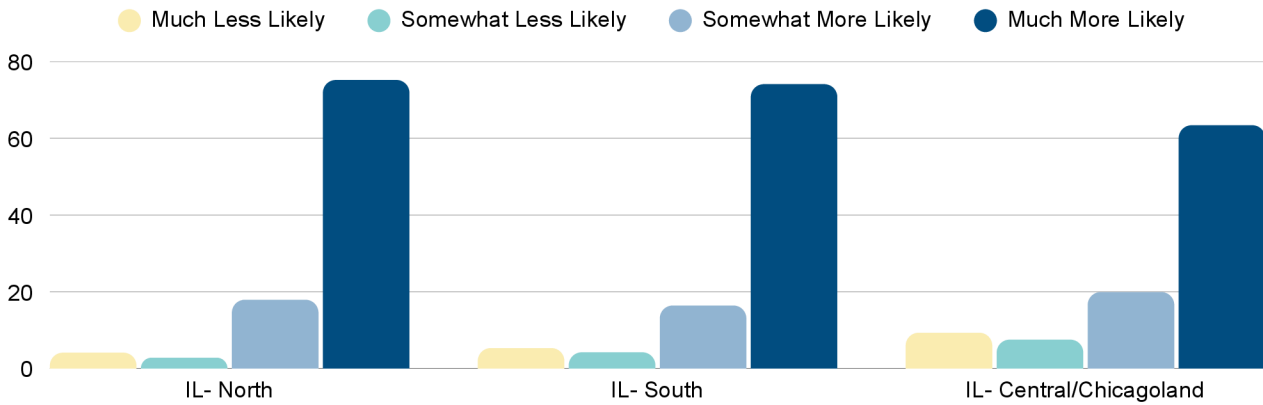
SURVEY RESULTS AND SHORT-TERM LOGIC MODEL OUTCOMES

The following section reports the results of the FYSB performance measure exit survey questions. These results are presented below, ordered according to the short-term logic model outcome presented in the Overview section. The logic model outcome to which each exit survey question result most closely pertains is indicated before the analysis.

The following exit survey question aligns with these logic model outcomes:
 Intentions to delay sexual activity; Skills to set sexual boundaries; Success Sequencing for poverty prevention

Summary:

After completing The Success Sequence Program, a majority of respondents had a higher likelihood to plan to delay having sexual intercourse until they were married across all three Illinois SRAE program implementations, including Illinois North (93.1%), Illinois South (90.5%) and Illinois Central and Chicagoland (83.3%), an Illinois average of (89%).

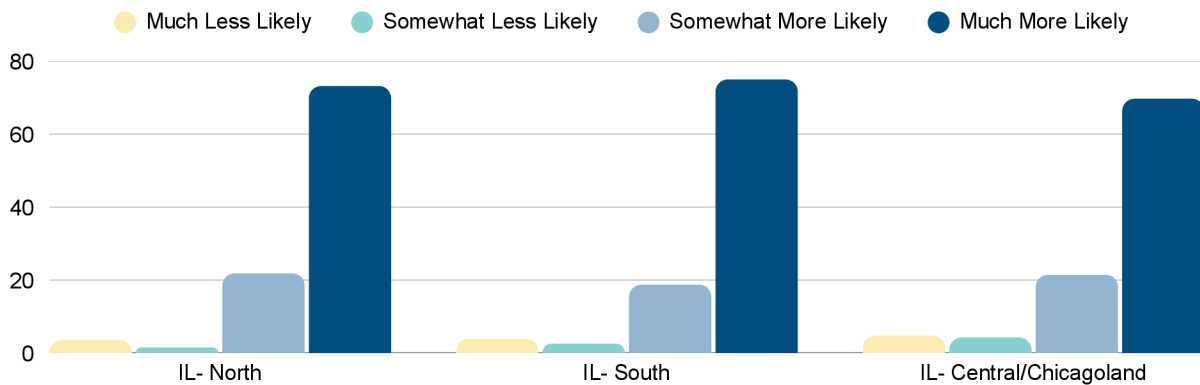

Summary:

After completing The Success Sequence Program, a majority of respondents had a higher likelihood to resist or say no to someone if they are pressured to have sex across all three Illinois SRAE program implementations, including Illinois North (95%), Illinois South (93.7%) and Illinois Central and Chicagoland (91.1%), an Illinois average of (93.2%).
